

Wow! What a day! Only bad part was rising at 4:00 am





to meet the gang with 12 cars at the bridge. Breakfast and reception at Matick Chevrolet where we received most of our race day credentials. I could hardly lift my arm due to the mass of wrist bands getting me access to various areas on Belle Isle. I had phoned the main organizer for Matick, Ryan Esler, on Friday and got his voice mail, where he said he would be out of the office until Monday. When I was at Matick, I asked the master of ceremonies if he was Ryan and he said "No". His name was Alan Johnson, Performance Vehicle Sales Manager, and Ryan would not be there. Ryan's wife had a baby yesterday. Great catered hot breakfast – eggs, bacon, sausage, potatoes, pancakes, bagels, desserts, coffee, juices etc. The reception was held in the largest indoor dealer showroom in the US. They store about 100 Corvettes in there, but had moved about 40 out to make room for the reception. They have over 140 'Vettes in stock, all indoors and sell, on average, a Corvette a day. Ed Jones comment to him was Reaume Chev in La Salle, where he was dealer principle, sold about three Corvettes a year. Police closed off the streets for 120 Corvettes to parade down to Belle Isle. Well what started as a nice single file line led by a Matick representative Corvette, turned into a 3 lane wide race down I 96. What a sight! Corvettes everywhere. Other motorists were gawking as this armada of high tech plastic roared past them.

When we get to Belle Isle, we got to park in the Continental Tire Corvette only parking, right next to the Chevrolet reception tent. After signing in at the Chevrolet Car Corral I could hardly lift my arm for all of the credential bands on my wrist. We were then free to watch the pre-feature races – Super Stadium Trucks, WeatherTech IMSA, Trans Am and Indycar qualifying, browse the multitude of booths and wander through the paddock. The crew facilities in the paddock are absolutely amazing. These monster rigs with their covered service bays are fabulous. I should not be amazed, this level of racing is only just below Formula One. Even the IMSA transport trucks and portable garages are almost as exotic, just on a slightly smaller scale. We had passes for seating in the City of Windsor grandstand right at the pit road exit and









had a great view of turn 1. I had brought ear plugs and really needed them to enjoy the experience and not lose any more of my already poor hearing. My working in the past with top fuel drag race cars had not helped my higher









frequency hearing reception. At noon Chevrolet put on a catered lunch – pulled pork sliders or spicy chicken balls, salads, fruit, drinks etc. There were raffle awards and free food and drinks (no beer) which lasted all day until 6:00 pm. Our group of 12 would come and go. You would do things together and then split and do stuff on your own. What a great job. Thank you Chevy!

At 5:30 pm there was a line up for 100 hundred lucky drivers to do between 2 and 4 laps around the circuit. Get in line, show your driver's license and insurance and then both driver and passenger had to sign a release. After registration there was a lengthy wait. Finally there was the safety talk. It was now 7:15 pm and I was concerned the setting sun would have an impact on our ability to be able to see the corners when on the track, but it turned out to not be a

problem. Now it was about to begin. During the safety talk, they kept referring to the laps as being "a pace lap", however, it turned out to be a "pedal to the metal, errrrr







fibreglass?" right from the get go depending upon the nerve or stupidity of the driver. What an unbelievable experience. I had been all around race cars for the first half of my life, but never driven a legitimate road course. That concrete barrier comes up on you VERY fast when exiting turn 11. It is about a 135 degree right hander that just keeps









on coming and you don't want the front end to "push" or you'll snag the wall. The other more exciting turn for me was the left hand, off camber, turn number 2. This is unique in that the turn tightens up as you go through, but you want to keep accelerating. We did a total of four laps, each faster than the one before, but still nowhere near race car speed. Most of the time I was in 1st or 2nd gear and the revs were around 5500 rpm. Finally got into 3rd on the two long straights and got up to 140 km/hr. By the time we're done, I mean literally, it was about 8:00pm. What a rush!!! Best time I have had in a long time! I am sure the rest of the members and partners had a great time as well. Thank you Ed Jones, Matick and Chevrolet!





Canadian Coasters Tour

Canadian Coasters (110 antique and collector vehicles) driving from Victoria British Columbia to St. John Newfoundland, stopped at the Canadian Heritage Transportation Museum on Friday, July 28, 2017.

This was a special year for the Canadian Coasters as they celebrated their 50th anniversary of their first cross Canada tour. It became another anniversary of 150 years of Confederation. This year 100 old car enthusiasts gathered in Victoria, BC for the 70 day, 8,000 kilometre trip all the way to St. John's Newfoundland. Note they have to drive home, so the ones who started in Nova Scotia are on their way home, after already

driving out to BC. Of the group, 81 pull trailers, 2 are in converted busses and 17 stay in hotels. The Greyhound converted busses/motor homes are allowed because one is a '67 and the other a '63. Nine provinces, all except Manitoba, plus Nevada and Iowa are represented. This is a "run what you brung" group, from a '31 Model A Ford, a '48 Bell Telephone truck, a converted Fire Rescue truck, a '69 Pontiac ambulance, a Cummins diesel powered modified '53 Club Cab pick-up. Last tour they had a Corvette, but not this time. I think the newest vehicle is at least 30 years old. Unfortunately some of the vehicles break down, but are helped by local car clubs to get going again. They don't run the expressways and visit small towns where the people are excited and like to see the troup. Before coming to Heritage Village, Kingsville, they were in Blenheim. Visited R & M and then did an unusual back track to Windsor. From here, next stop is Jordan, Ontario wine country, with a side trip to Niagara Falls. They like to keep the group around 100 vehicles. This makes it manageable, plus they don't run as a train. People will link up in small groups while others make side trips to visit friends or tourist sites and then meet up again an a few days. It is a very social group. Everyone knows everyone. They have one major sponsor, Raybestos, who supplies caps and T shirts as give aways in their door prizes. One lady I was introduced to, Pat Johnson, is called the "Licorice Lady" because she is always handing out the black candy. I got a lot of information from the owner of the ambulance, Fraser Field from Deroche, BC. There was Bill Sauder from Hamilton, who I think owned the converted fire truck, and Tom and Pat Denis from Alberta. Unfortunately I didn't get names of others I spoke with. All in all a very friendly group who also own and DRIVE some very nice vehicles.

Seat belts !!!!

Corvette overturned, passenger ejected in serious Shea Heights accident

Two men taken to hospital after accident on Blackhead Road, Shea Heights, Newfoundland, near Cape Spear, just south of St. John's.





Police closed a popular road near Cape Spear following a serious motor vehicle accident Wednesday afternoon involving a Corvette that ended up on its roof.

The 22-year-old male driver was taken to hospital in serious condition, as was the 27-year-old male passenger, who was ejected from the car. Unfortunately, the passenger who was unbelted, later died in hospital.

Still no confirmed cause but more information was released:

The RNC confirms the 28-year-old man who was ejected from the Corvette during the rollover on Blackhead Road was not belted in.

"Our investigation has revealed that the person was not wearing a seat belt," Sgt. Paul Didham told CBC News.

He is in hospital, in serious condition, along with the 22-year-old man who was driving the car that ended up on its roof.

The debris trail from the accident was 850 metres — about a kilometre long

The new world's record Corvette is a Red on Red coupe and the only L88 coupe of record to receive the highly coveted Duntov Mark of Excellence Award. The new record holder is equipped with the C48 Heater Defrost Delete, F41 Special Front and Rear Suspension, G81 Positraction Rear Axle, J50 Vacuum Power Brakes, J56 Special Heavy Duty Brakes, K66 Transistor Ignition, L88 427 ci, 430 hp (factory rating) Engine, and the M22 Heavy Duty, Close Ratio, 4 Speed Transmission. In addition it also has the RPO A85, shoulder belts and another important feature which sets this L88 apart is the special order rear end ratio of 4.56:1, the drag racing rear end of choice, while most other 1967 L88's came with the 4:11 rear end more suitable to road racing. The car was restored by the renowned Nabers Brothers of Houston, is fully documented and was represented at the request of the owner by Roy Sinor, well-known, recently-retired National Corvette Restorers Society national judging chairman and one of the experts Barrett-Jackson uses for Corvette consultations.



Obviously the 1967 Corvette L88 is one of the rarest and most sought after of all Corvettes and has become not only the zenith of Corvettes but it has been called the American equivalent of the Ferrari 250 GTO, the world's greatest collector car. Vic Edelbrock Jr., 1936-2017: Built Torrance highperformance auto parts company into industry giant


Vic Edelbrock Jr., who spent five decades at the helm of the Torrance-based company started by his father and was considered a visionary in the high-performance auto parts industry, has died. He was 80.

Edelbrock passed away Friday at his home in Rolling Hills from what a company Facebook post attributed to complications from a recent cold. "His passing was peaceful and in the company of his closest friends and family," according to the post.

Edelbrock was just 12 when he began spending summers working around his father's auto parts shop for \$2 an hour and 26 when Vic Edelbrock Sr. died of cancer in 1962 and he inherited the business.

In carrying on his father's legacy, Edelbrock helped reshape an industry devoted to designing and manufacturing high-quality, high-performance replacement parts for the automotive and motorcycle aftermarkets.

In no time, Edelbrock Corp., which is based in Torrance off Crenshaw Boulevard and has a foundry in San Jacinto, was considered royalty in the automotive world, known to car buffs everywhere.



Edelbrock's father, Vic Edelbrock Sr., was a broadfaced farm boy from Kansas who opened his first auto speed shop in the 1930s on Wilshire Boulevard in Beverly Hills, according to the company's website.

Edelbrock was born in 1936, four years after his father bought his first "project car" — a 1932 Ford Roadster.

He watched as his father's reputation as an elite mechanic grew. Meanwhile, the Roadster became a foray for the family business into the world of hot rods. It would spark the design and manufacture of the first Edelbrock intake manifold — the part of an engine that supplies the fuel/air mixture to the cylinders.

Edelbrock Sr. would strike gold as his manifolds helped hot rods win races on California's dry lake beds. The elder Edelbrock would push the business to greater heights, continuing to innovate and grow.

When his son became president and CEO of Edelbrock Corp., the company had just 10 employees, annual sales of \$450,000 and \$200,000 in the bank. He built it into a multimillion-dollar enterprise with its own development labs, ad department and assembly lines employing 700 people in three shifts.

In the 1980s and '90s he moved Edelbrock Corp. into a new direction with a product line that included carburetors, camshaft kids, valve train parts, exhaust systems and engine accessories, among other things.

The company that built its reputation in racing began thriving on outfitting street, kit and restoration cars. New high-tech shocks and heavy duty suspension parts became part of its portfolio, especially significant when sport utility vehicles became so ubiquitous.

Key to the self-sufficient company was its foundry, allowing Edelbrock to control the quality of its aluminum castings. Edelbrock Foundry Corp. is an aluminum green sand foundry built by the company from scratch in San Jacinto, near Hemet and Palm Springs, in 1988.

"Our aluminum castings are very important to us because there are so few foundries in the United States that can supply us with the type of castings that we need," Edelbrock said in an interview for a 2000 article in the Daily Breeze.

"We want to control our own destiny," Edelbrock said in another interview.

Edelbrock, the only child of Edelbrock Sr., graduated from Dorsey High School and attended USC on a football scholarship. He graduated with a degree in business in 1959, just three years before his father's diagnosis and death from inoperable cancer.

He earned his pilot's license in 1968 and would fly from Torrance to the desert to check on his San Jacinto foundry. Edelbrock, who also liked to race cars and boats, served as president and CEO of Edelbrock Corp. until 2010, when he gave up those positions but stayed on as chairman of the board.
