

Club Events

Thursday April 18, 2019

There were 40 members attending the April Club meeting. The meeting was opened at 6:30 pm by Dan Reaume and then Ed Jones introduced our guest speaker Cathy Schmidt.



Cathy is the Volunteer Services Coordinator for Canadian Blood Services in Windsor where she has been for 20 years. She explained that blood services has been performed by Canadian Blood Services since the Red Cross tainted blood scandal in the 1980's. Blood only has a shelf life of 8 days, so it is critical to maintain a regular supply of fresh blood. There have been times in Windsor where the inventory was down to 1 ½ days and called for donors were immediately made.


In the last couple of years restrictions on who can donate blood have been drastically reduced. Currently

you need to be 18 years old, but there is no longer an upper limit age restriction. Cathy mentioned

that many donors are in their 70's and 80's, even in their 90's. Check the Canadian Blood Services web site https://www.blood.ca/ for more details on restrictions. She also told us that each donation is tested for things like Syphils. Hepatitis, HIV etc.

She told us they are looking for groups, like our club, and suggested that we donate together. A group can be as small as three donors. Ed Jones will coordinate this activity. She also is promoting organ donations and asked everybody to sign their donor cards. It is important to tell your family of your wishes so in the event that your organs are to be harvested there will not be family resistance. Check out beadonor.ca for more information and how to register.

At the finale of her talk she asked if the Canadian Blood Services could have a tent at Our Waterfront show, which was met with unanimous approval after Bryan Hansen approved the request. Then Cathy left to universal applause.





The meeting then continued with Gary McGuinness presenting the treasurer's report. Membership report by Bob Small was delayed waiting for the stragglers and snowbirds to register for 2019 year. Bryan Hansen told us about the items he already has under control for the car show in Jun – tents, insurance, porta johns, parking lot, sponsors etc. Bryan will be collecting door prizes and items for silent auction at his house and Ed Jones is looking after goody bags and stuffing at his house. Les Tetler suggested we use glass trophies instead of the traditional trophies. Marilyn Fahringer tols us

about a "dish" trophy she has which can be used later as a candy dish. Bryan said he has talked to the "bike rider" who last year complained to the police about the cars using the trail and thinks he has the issue corrected for this year. Lynda Reaume talked about future events like Casa Bella and Wolfhead. Ed Jones explained more about his September Route 66 trip from Chicago to St. Louis, At the end there will be activities such as a river boat cruise and climbing of the St. Louis Arch. He still has space for one more participant. Ron talked about the Molly & OJ's and RM Restorations excursion. He emphasised the need for those who had signed up to make sure they showed up and those who were not going to meet at CTC in Essex to let Brian Deloge know in advance. The Club approved two \$100 gift cards donations to the RM leaders who are coming in specifically to tour us through their facility. Peter asked for a recent list of major sponsors for the Newsletter. It was suggested that all sponsors, regardless of how much they donated, be acknowledged in the Newsletter. We were reminded that 10% of all food and drink purchases made at Central Park Athletics are returned to the club. Peter reminded the Club about the Spring Fling car show in Wasaga Beach at the end of May. The CCCC is expecting the Windsor members who went for judging training attend this show and assist in the judging. Ron Hillier said he is going but all of the hotels in Wasaga Beach are full so he is staying out of town.

Molly and OJ's then on to R&M Restorations

Our caravan of 30 Corvettes left the Canadian Tire parking lot in Essex, promptly at 10:00 am led with our leader Brian Deloge on point heading to Molly & OJ's restaurant. Family-run for generations, Molly & OJ's is an historic cornerstone in the resort-like community of Erieau, Ontario. Molly & OJ's Restaurant is set on the shores of beautiful Lake Erie.

When we got to Molly & OJ's place at 11:30 am, we had picked up several more cars who, because of their start location, had driven there. There were now 35 'Vettes parked around the restaurant entrance. It was a challenge for the kitchen and wait staff at Molly's to serve 70 people for lunch but they were well prepared and did a great job and got us all out in time to get to our next destination on time, RM Restorations.



After a nice lunch, it became quite a sight for the locals to watch this impressive string of Corvettes, from C3's to C7's to drive by. A short run up to Blenheim where we filled the RM Restorations



parking lot with our cars. The group was greeted by Ernie Morreau, the General Manager of RM Restorations, where he guided us through the various sections of their workshops and then on into their museum. We were privilegded to be able to tour the workshops, but because of the confidentiality of what goes on in the shops, there was no photography or stories permitted.



Ernie Morreau - 24 years with RM

Here is part of the story about Rob Myers and the development of RM Auto Restoration, the business that restores, repairs, and auctions some of the most expensive cars in the world.



Rob Myers started his first restoration shop in a single car garage in Chatham in 1976, and quickly developed a powerful reputation and strong following among car collectors across Canada and the United States.

In 1978, Myers opened his own 40-foot-by-80-foot garage where he started out restoring the old cars his father's friends would bring by. After racking up more than a few satisfied customers, word spread. Myers expanded into bodywork.



As Rob's reputation grew, so did his business, with Rob eventually partnering with Dan Warrener and Mike Fairbairn to expand their services and facilities beyond restoration and into sales and auctions.



In 1991 RM Auctions was formed in Blenheim, Ontario and the once tiny garage became a mecca for classic automobile aficionados, pumping out tons of restorations each year and racking up no fewer than six Best of Show awards at the prestigious Pebble Beach Concours d'Elegance.

The following is their incredible Best in Show awards at Pebble Beach:

2001 1930 Mercedes Benz SS Roadster

2004 1938 Horch 853 Roadster

2006 1931 Daimler twin six

2010 1933 Delage D8S

2013 1934 Packard Twelve Convertible Victoria

2015 1924 Isotta Fraschini 8A Cabriolet

In 2015, the same year the RM group posted \$593 million in combined auction sales, Myers finalized a deal to partner with historic auctioneering company Sotheby's.





Probably the most disappointing entry that RM has had was their gorgeous 1937 Cadillac which was runner up in 2018 to Best in Show.

Now, Rob reflects, "it's really cool to be a 60-year-old old guy that started in Chatham, Ontario, when I was 18-years-old and be able to sit here today and say our restoration shop is the finest in the world."



After our Corvette Club of Windsor invite and tour with 35 Corvettes parked in the parking lot at RM we certainly agree with these sentiments.


Saturday, May 11, 2019



2019 Cruise to Lingenfelter Collection in Brighton, Michigan from Matick Chevrolet in Redford, Michigan sponsored by Competition Corvette Club of Michigan.

Hugh Pillon and Peter had a great

day with an early start and breakfast at Matick Chevrolet in Redford, Michigan. We had registered with Competition Corvette Club of Michigan for their 3rd Annual Spring Cruise to see the Lingenfelter Collection in Brighton, Michigan.



The microphone was passed to Club VP and Event Coordinator Mike Cook to present the door prizes. Then it was back to Rod for special awards. First and second to register received a gift. The oldest Corvette award was presented to David Harazian for his '64 C2 Convertible. The youngetst person was a 9 year old girl. Longest distance at 408 miles went to a driver from Indiana. Most club members, with I believe 11 members went to Renegades Club from Grand Blanc/Lake Orion, Michigan. Visitor from a foreign country was taken by Hugh Pillon of the CC of W. Then plaques were presented to the State Police and the Wayne County Sheriff's Department. The Sheriff Commander then gave a pep talk on safety and how we would caravan to Lingenfelters, 35 – 40 mph, but drive safe, close and don't leave big gaps.













With the cars already staged it was a very organized group that followed the leader out of Matick's parking lot. There were at least 5 Police vehicles which blocked every intersection we went past, and each would then roar past the 'Vettes to get to the next open intersection. It was straight out of a movie where there is an



intensive chase scene. One of the Sherriff's police vehicles was a Ford Crown Victoria and it's 4.6L SOHC V8 power plant was severely tested as this beast roared its way past us at about 140 km/hr, every light on it flashing and the siren wailing. The Corvettes had their 4 way flashers on so most of

the oncoming traffic pulled over and stopped thinking we were a



funeral. This manouvre allowed the police room on the two lane road portions to catch up, but with 98 Corvettes it took a while for the procession to go by. We arrive at Lingenfelters without incident, except

that some of the road surface was in terrible shape. My 30 series tires complained at every bump and pot hole, of which there were many, not to say what the bumping did to my bladder.

When I was walking up past the police cars I asked them if they practiced that chase scene and without batting an eye, one of the officers replied "Every day!"



Inside Lingenfelters is a car nuts dream. There is hardly a "stock" car in the place, with I think one Ford and an AMC Gremlin mixed in with the Ferraris, one an Enzo, a Lamborghini Reventon and a Bugatti Vehron plus many modified Corvettes on display. There was a section set aside for the sale of memorabilia and momentos. Meanwhile Ken was busy signing his famous posters.





















Ken fired up a hand built, wide body '64 Custom Corvette with about a 1000 hp and revved it up to a rowdy cackle fest of noise. The red one on the right.

Also what a comparison – stock versus wide body – first REAL wide body I have ever seen like this!



Now there are some exotics.







Later he started the Ferrari Enzo and its 12 cylinders produced a unique sound even sweeter to my ears than a Corvette V8.

Was the First of New Production V12's from Ferrari which share the architecture and Bore Spacing of 104mm with the Maserati 4.2 Litre V8





Good evening Peter, this is the story about Competition Corvette Club of Michigan. Our model is (Kids, Families, and Communities). We are strongly committed to reaching out to organizations throughout Southeast Michigan that support the needs of kids and families.

Here are some examples. The Ronald McDonald House Ann Arbor, as you know kids are treated there with life threatening illness and while the child in being treated the parents can stay on site and be with their child through the process. We plan 3 to 4 dates a year with the facility and our members prepare full meals for all the families stay at the facility. Giving them one less thing to deal with. The kids that are able to come outside get to see the Corvettes and take pictures, it makes for a great distraction for what they are going through.

The Detroit Phoenix Center, this organization is reaching out to help homeless youth in Detroit. Kids can go to the facility and do homework, wash clothes, take a shower as well as get food, and other basic items needed for day to day life. We just partnered with this organization, and will be purchasing \$500.00 in personal hygiene items as well as meeting with their leadership team and joining their mentoring program.

Trunk or Treat with Detroit Police Department is another activity we do for kids, not only are we demonstrating we are adults that care about kids, we are showing the kids how fun and rewarding it is to work with the police. We are that vehicle connecting kids and law enforcement.

We understand that many families find themselves struggling around the holiday season. Over the last 3 years, we have provide Thanksgiving Meals that will serve a family of 6 for close to 200 families. Christmas we adopt several families and make sure they have food and gifts that they otherwise would not have. We want as many kids as possible to wake up on Christmas and have gifts to open.

Detroit Public Schools Foundation (Director Pamela Moore), work with organizations to raise funds throughout the year to provide College Scholarships to graduating Detroit Public School students. The last 2 years we have donated over \$2500.00 matching dollars to support scholarships. We have also giving scholarships to Charter schools in Metro Detroit.

Competition Corvette Club believes if we lift up our kids and show them that they matter and we believe in them and what they can accomplish with their futures that will strengthen the family which will make our communities stronger.

Let me say our mission is to utilize our Corvettes as a hook to reach young people and began having conversations about the importance of a quality education, and making good decisions at an early age. To be examples of success stories, show them that staying in school, then working hard in whatever career they choose will allow them to develop a sound quality of life.

I am also including additional information about our club.

Competition Corvette Club was originally formed in 1993 in the city of Inkster Michigan, the organization is now a tri-state operation later joined by Toledo Ohio in 2003, with Indiana following in 2011. The Michigan chapter disbanded in 2009 and was reformed in July 2016 under our current leadership. President Rod Grimes, Vice President Michael Cook, Treasurer Wayne Little, Secretary Maurice Evans and Sgt.at Arms Derrick Fletcher. Our current membership stands at 14 members with 5 individuals slated to be voted in at our June monthly meeting. Our members come from various backgrounds. I have served in law enforcement for 41 years, retiring from the Detroit Police Department 25 years (Sergeant). 14 years with Detroit Public Schools Police Department, retiring (Chief) and now in my third year with the Oakland County Sheriff Department. Mr. Evans our Secretary is the CEO of a Charter School District servicing close to 2000 students. Our other 3 officers all had successful careers in the military and all are now in management positions in their civilian jobs. Now it may be clear as why we believe so strongly in supporting kids and families while giving back in our communities.

Our members are Managers in retail, Electrician, Business Owner, Tow Truck Driver, (3) Executive Chefs, CPA and retired members.

Experts Say Beware of Counterfeit Corvettes and Other Classics

"Let the buyer beware" is no more important than when someone is buying a classic car like, say, a C2 Corvette.

That's the takeaway from a recent story in the New York Post detailing how counterfeit carmakers are scamming enthusiasts of all brands of collector cars.

The story cites the example of Mike Craig, who suffered the ultimate embarrassment for a Corvette enthusiast when he was told by NCRS officials at the Midwest meet in Missouri in 2013 that his beloved 1967 Corvette 427 was a fake.

"They told me to take the car off the show floor," the 76-year-old Craig recalled. "I had to load it onto the trailer and leave like a thief in the night. It was embarrassing."

Craig wound up losing \$100 grand on the car, counting the costs of a failed lawsuit. He eventually sold the Corvette, in which he had invested \$117,000, for just \$55,000 to a buyer who knew what he was getting.

Not everyone knows they're being hoodwinked, however.

Legendary Corvette restorer Kevin Mackay of Corvette Repair in Valley Stream, N.Y., says it's easy for unscrupulous shops to get the parts to turn an ordinary car into what appears to be a much more valuable classic.

"This is big business," Mackay said. "You start with, say, a low-end 1967 Corvette and buy it for \$30,000. Put in a big-block motor that was built a couple of months before the car's body and restamp the serial number on the engine [so it matches the car]. You put the hood-stripe on, change some of the suspension pieces, the rear end, the tachometer, the oil-pressure gauge."

Even what appears to be a well-documented car can sometimes turn out to be a fake, the Post reports.

Vintage car attorney Bryan W. Shook of Pennsylvania recalls the case of a very rare 1960s Chevelle SS. His client paid \$100,000 for the car, then sought to determine the rarity of the car. "He hired an expert who (said), 'The paperwork is real. The car is fake.'"

Apparently the documentation for another Chevelle that had been totaled had been purchased by the seller, who then made up a car to match that paperwork.

Such scams even happen to wealthy car enthusiasts like comedian Jerry Seinfeld. Last month, he was sued over the 2016 sale of a 1958 Porsche Carrera GT for \$1.54 million that was apparently not the real deal. Seinfeld has, in turn, sued the dealer who originally sold him the car.
